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# FOGAS not renewing cat shelter contract

After 18 years of service, The Friends of Gonzales Animal Shelter will not renew its contract with the city of Gonzales as a cat shelter.

During its 18 years of service, the non-profit organization has run as a "no-kill" facility, and no cats were killed to make space for new intakes, according to a FOGAS press release.

"This was achieved largely through grants providing just over \$500,000 in new funds from outside our community," the press release stated. "These funds were mainly for spay/neuter of dogs and cats owned by county residents and trap/neuter/return to field for community owned cats."

Due to old age, three of the FO-GAS's most active volunteers are in their 80s and dealing with health

challenges.

"We, like 70% of animal rescue groups, will not be operating a shelter. We'll revert to being a foster care network and seek out additional spay/neuter grants as we always have," the press release continued.

FOGAS member Chris Weaver said the shelter has a lot property, equipment, and possessions that a



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## **USDA** extends deadline for Organic Market **Development Grants**

#### **SPECIAL TO THE INQUIRER**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has extended the deadline for the Organic Market Development Grants (OMDG) Request for Applications (RFA) to August 8, 2023.

Through OMDG, USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) will issue up to \$75 million in competitive grants. Eligible entities include businesses that produce or handle organic foods, non-profit organizations, tribal governments, and state and local government entities to fund projects designed to expand and improve markets for domestically produced organic products. OMDG is intended to increase the consumption of domestic agricultural commodities by aiding in the expansion of markets or development of new markets, marketing facilities, and uses for such commodities. For example, applicants may seek funding to develop and launch new consumer products using rotational grains or invest in infrastructure like processing equipment to give producers better access to markets.

AMS encourages applications that serve smaller farms and ranches, new and beginning farmers and ranchers, underserved producers, veteran producers and underserved communities.

Applications must be submitted through www. grants.gov by August 8, 2023.

Q. What causes blossom end rot of tomatoes? Can I prevent it?

A. Blossom End Rot is caused by a break in the calcium availability to the plant because water availability is not steady. It does not usually reduce Blossom End Rot by adding calcium, but it helps to make sure the tomatoes don't dry out between watering. Weather is an important factor too. If the plant is growing aggressively in response to weather modifications, it is more likely to contribute to causing blossom end rot. Some tomato varieties are also more likely to be susceptible to blossom end rot and growing the plants in small containers also seems to contribute. To the problem.

## Preventing blossom end rot, keeping algae out of bird baths and more

Q. We have several bird baths in place, and they are heavily used by many species of birds. Is it a problem if algae grow in the birdbaths or do we need to clean it out every day?

A. It is best in the long run if the algae population is controlled by rinsing and occasional treatment with vinegar, but it is not a major issue. My bird baths grow algae but just like yours the birds still seem to relish the water that is available.

Q. We have used tatuma squash this spring instead of regular summer squash to prevent attacks by the vine borers. It is working great. I have related the success to my local nursery, but he still does not offer Tatuma on his seed rack. Why is he so stubborn, does he not believe the

A. Gardeners like regular sum-

mer squash even if it is susceptible to vine borers and it is not always easy to add new seed selections to the rack especially if the addition is only sought in a small area of a wholesaler's sales area. We will just have to keep buying the Tatuma seed from computer sales outlets until demand is high enough for our local retailers to connect with a willing wholesale supplier.

Q. It took us awhile because of the freezes last winter to get our sweet peas to grow but they are wonderful now with the bright colors and fragrance. How long will they last this summer?

A. Depending how fast the weather turns hot they will probably last through June. Have you been able to use them for cut flowers in addition to being displayed in the flower garden?

## Legislature approves open government bills in session's final days

#### **SPECIAL TO THE INQUIRER**

Major transparency initiatives shoring up the Texas Public Information Act won approval in the state Legislature before the session's final day Monday, May 29. The legislation now heads to Gov. Greg Abbott.

A measure by Rep. Joe Moody, D-El Paso, that won final passage Sunday night would close a legal loophole used by some police departments to withhold records when a person dies in police custody or in other interactions with law enforcement. House Bill 30, which had been debated in previous sessions, took on additional urgency after the mass shooting at an elementary school in Uvalde and the lack of transparency afterward by law enforcement and public officials.

Moody tweeted that closing the loophole was about policy and people, saying, "I worked this for six years, but Uvalde elevated the issue for the last one, and I'm so proud to finally deliver a path to the answers the people deserve."

"This is a huge step in protecting the public's right to know. We look forward to the governor signing this important bill," added Kelley Shannon, executive director of the nonprofit Freedom of Information Foundation of Texas.

Another significant and successful open government measure this session defines "business days" in the Public Information Act to ensure consistency in how the law is carried out. It is included in House Bill 3033 by Rep. Brooks Landgraf, R-Odessa, and sponsored by Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, in the Senate.

Like the Moody legislation closing the law enforcement loophole, which was sponsored by Sen. Phil King, R-Weatherford, in the Senate, the Public Information Act legislation by Landgraf and Zaffirini was a bipartisan effort involving multiple lawmakers.

"We have had the pleasure of working with stakeholders and lawmakers from both sides of the aisle this session and are thrilled to see the Texas Legislature prioritizing increasing government transparency by closing off loopholes in the law and ensuring consistent application of the Texas Public Information Act in the future," said First Amendment attorney Laura Prather, legislative committee co-chair of the FOI Foundation of Texas.


This year marks the 50th anniversary of the Texas Public Information Act. The FOI Foundation joined more than a dozen other organizations in forming the Texas Sunshine Coalition, a diverse group spanning the policy and political spectrum that aims to protect and improve the landmark law.


The "business days" legislation will ensure uniformity in the timelines for how governments across Texas respond to Public Information Act requests. Currently, many governments come up with their own rules for what constitutes a business day by declaring that days don't count if an office's physical doors are closed on work-from-home days or self-declared "skeleton crew" days. This problem intensified during the COVÎD-19 pandemic.


Rep. Terry Canales, D-Edinburg, filed the reform bill as stand-alone legislation in the House then worked with Landgraf to amend it to House Bill 3033. It was a leading initiative of the Texas Sunshine Coalition.


The base bill by Landgraf calls for the prompt release of basic government information to those requesting it and requires improved communication by the governmental body to requestors. In a separate amendment to the bill, Sen. Nathan Johnson, D-Dallas, added a section protecting requestors' rights amid the temporary withholding of records related to settlement negotiations in big lawsuits waged by the Texas Attorney General's Office.

Moody also shepherded an amendment to help governments deal with repeat requestors who use large amounts of government staff time and are suspected of using pseudonyms to get around time limits in the law. Moody worked with

## LCRA board approves business, capital plans

term contracts with retail utilities.

#### **SPECIAL TO THE INQUIRER**

The LCRA Board of Directors on Wednesday, May 24, approved a business plan of about \$565 million and authorized capital investments of about \$1.17 billion for energy, water and public service projects to support Texas in fiscal year 2024.

The Lower Colorado River Authority is the primary wholesale provider of electricity in Central Texas and manages the lower Colorado River and six Highland Lakes. LCRA **Transmission Services Corporation** is one of the largest electric transmission service providers in Texas.

As one of the largest public power providers in the state, LCRA is helping to meet the increasing need for power in Texas. LCRA provides power for cooperatives and small towns in Central Texas by selling wholesale electricity through long-

In January, LCRA announced it is building a new natural gas-fired peaker power plant in Central Texas to provide an additional 190 megawatts of dispatchable power to the Texas power grid. A peaker plant typically is used for brief periods when the demand for power ap-

proaches or surpasses the amount

of power available. LCRA's capital

budget includes the new plant, which is expected to be operational in 2025. LCRA TSC plans to invest about \$3 billion in the next five years to build new transmission facilities and improve existing ones. LCRA TSC will undertake numerous projects to increase reliability, meet

electricity, and connect new electric generators to the grid. LCRA also continues to make

existing and projected needs for

investments to increase regional water supplies and will continue to maintain and invest in its system of dams, which are critical to protect water supplies and continue flood management.

Over the next five years, LCRA plans to invest about \$159 million in development of new water supply projects and more than \$38 million in rehabilitation projects to help ensure the dams continue to operate safely and effectively, meeting all state regulations for dam safety.

LCRA does not receive state appropriations or have the ability to levy taxes. LCRA is funded by the revenues its businesses generate.





These notices shall satisfy three separate but related procedural requirements for activities to be undertaken by the City of Gonzales.

#### REQUEST FOR RELEASE OF FUNDS

On or about June 26, 2023, the Texas General Land Office (GLO) will authorize the City of Gonzales (City) to submit a request to HUD for the release of Community Development Block Grant – Mitigation (CDBG-MIT) Program funds under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, to undertake a project known as City of Gonzales Flood and Drainage Improvements (Project).

The City is proposing to replace storm sewer culverts, replace a low water crossing, and excavate and grade an existing channel to increase resilience to future flooding events and reduce or eliminate the long-term risk of loss of life, injury, damage to and loss of property, and suffering and hardship, by lessening the impact of future disasters. Construction shall take place within and adjacent to a portion of Tinsley Creek approximately 200 feet north of the intersection of Johnson Street and St. Andrew Street and approximately 100 feet north of the intersection of Johnson Street and St. Andrew Street. These activities would benefit 7,130 people of whom 4,085 (57.29%) are of low to moderate income. \$403,365.40 of the project will be funded through the CDBG-MIT Program under HUD Grant Number B-18-DP-48-0002; the amount of funding to come from the City of Gonzales is currently undetermined.

#### FINAL NOTICE AND PUBLIC REVIEW OF A PROPOSED ACTIVITY IN A 100-YEAR FLOODPLAIN AND WETLANDS

This is to give notice that the City has conducted an evaluation as required by Executive Order 11988 and 11990, in accordance with HUD regulations at 24 CFR 55.20 Subpart C Procedures for Making Determinations on Floodplain Management and Protection of Wetlands, to determine the potential affect that its activity in the floodplain and wetland will have on the human environment.

A review of FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Map, Community Panel 48177C0240D, effective on 01/22/2020, shows 0.89 acres of the site is located within the Regulatory Floodway (Zone AE Floodway), less than 0.01 acres occur within the 100-floodplain (Zone AE), and approximately 0.13 acres of the Project is located within the Tinsley Creek riverine wetland feature. Construction of the project is considered a functionally dependent activity.

The City has considered the following alternatives and mitigation measures to be taken to minimize adverse impacts and to restore and preserve natural and beneficial values: 1) different box culvert size and elevation, 2) locations outside of the floodplain, and 3) the no action alternative. An evaluation of Alternative 1 determined that setting the culverts at a higher elevation in order to minimize excavation within the floodplain and wetland was not practicable because of rising flood elevation concerns. The chosen culvert size and elevation will be needed to improve flood water conveyance and reduce risk to area residents. Regarding Alternative 2, as all Tinsley Creek culverts and low water crossing are located in the floodway, there are no alternative project locations outside of the floodplain. The project site selected was determined to provide the maximum benefit to residents living in the Project area. The no action Alternative 3 would prevent the project area culverts and low water crossing from being replaced, leaving area residents at greater risk for flood damage to their homes and businesses should another disaster. The no action alternative therefore fails to address the need for improved resilience against floods.

Construction of the Project was the preferred alternative because it is not anticipated to aggravate current hazards to floodplains or permanently disrupt floodplain or wetland

values. Based on the environmental review, the project as proposed, with the adapted best management practices, would not pose any significant hazards or adverse conditions for people, habitat, or the community at this location. The City will require adherence to Federal, State, and Local regulations and permitting practices. These include, but are not limited to, restriction of vehicle and material staging in floodplain and wetland areas and protecting floodplains and wetland features through silt fencing and appropriate management of construction waste and debris.

There are three primary purposes for this notice. First, people who may be affected by activities in floodplains and wetlands and those who have an interest in the protection of the natural environment should be given an opportunity to express their concerns and provide information about these areas. Second, an adequate public notice program can be an important public educational tool. The dissemination of information about floodplains and wetlands can facilitate and enhance Federal efforts to reduce the risks associated with the occupancy and modification of these special areas. Third, as a matter of fairness, when the Federal government determines it will participate in actions taking place in floodplains or wetlands, it must inform those who may be put at greater or continued risk.

#### FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT

TThe City has determined that the project will have no significant impact on the human environment. Therefore, an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA) is not required. Additional project information is contained in the Environmental Review Record (ERR) on file at the Gonzales City Hall, 820 St Joseph St., Gonzales, TX 78629. The record is available for review and may be examined or copied weekdays 9 A.M to 5 P.M.

#### PUBLIC COMMENTS

Any individual, group, or agency may submit written comments on the ERR to the City of Gonzales or HUD Disaster Recovery and Special Issues Division. Comments may be submitted to Mr. Tim Crow, Gonzales City Manager, via 820 St Joseph St., Gonzales, TX 78629 or by email to tcrow@gonzales.texas.gov. All comments received by June 23, 2023, will be considered by the City of Gonzales prior to authorizing submission of a request for release of funds. Comments should specify which Notice they are addressing.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL CERTIFICATION**

The City of Gonzales certifies to HUD that Tim Crow in his capacity as City Manager consents to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal Courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to the environmental review process and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. HUD's approval of the certification satisfies its responsibilities under NEPA and related laws and authorities and allows the City of Gonzales to use Program funds for the project.

#### **OBJECTIONS TO RELEASE OF FUNDS**

HUD will accept objections to its release of fund and the City's certification for a period of fifteen days following the anticipated submission date or its actual receipt of the request (whichever is later) only if they are on one of the following bases: (a) the certification was not executed by the Certifying Officer of the City of Gonzales; (b) the City of Gonzales has omitted a step or failed to make a decision or finding required by HUD regulations at 24 CFR part 58; (c) the grant recipient or other participants in the development process have committed funds, incurred costs or undertaken activities not authorized by 24 CFR Part 58 before approval of a release of funds by HUD; or (d) another Federal agency acting pursuant to 40 CFR Part 1504 has submitted a written finding that the project is unsatisfactory from the standpoint of environmental quality. La construcción se producirá dentro de una parte del Arroyo Tinsley y adyacente a ella, de aproximadamente 200 pies al norte del cruce de las calles Johnson Street y St. Andrew Street y aproximadamente 100 pies al norte del cruce de las calles Johnson Street y St. Andrew Street. Estas actividades beneficiarían a 7,130 personas, de las cuales 4,085 (57.29%) tienen ingresos bajos a moderados. Se financiarán \$403,365.40 del proyecto a través del Programa de CDBG-MIT con el Número de Subvención del HUD B-18-DP-48-0002; la cantidad de fondos que provendrán de la Ciudad de Gonzales actualmente está sin determinar.

#### AVISO FINAL Y REVISIÓN PÚBLICA DE UNA ACTIVIDAD PROPUESTA EN UNA LLANURA ALUVIAL CENTENARIA Y HUMEDALES

Por el presente, se notifica que la Ciudad ha realizado una evaluación según lo requerido por la Orden Ejecutiva 11988 y 11990, en conformidad con las normativas del HUD de la Subparte C: Procedimientos para tomar decisiones sobre gestión de llanuras aluviales y protección de humedales del 24 CFR 55.20, para determinar el efecto potencial que su actividad en la llanura aluvial y el humedal tendrá sobre el ambiente humano.

Una revisión del Mapa de Tasas del Seguro contra Inundaciones de FEMA, Panel Comunitario 48177C0240D, vigente desde el 22 de enero de 2020, muestra que 0.89 acres del predio se ubican dentro del Aliviadero Controlado (Aliviadero Zona AE), menos de 0.01 acres están dentro de la llanura aluvial centenaria (Zona AE) y aproximadamente 0.13 acres del Proyecto se ubican dentro del humedal ribereño del Arroyo Tinsley. La construcción del proyecto se considera una actividad dependiente en términos funcionales.

La Ciudad ha analizado la implementación de las siguientes alternativas y medidas de mitigación para minimizar los efectos perjudiciales y para recuperar y preservar los valores naturales y beneficiosos: 1) alcantarillas de diferentes tamaños y elevaciones, 2) ubicaciones fuera de la llanura aluvial y 3) la alternativa de no actuar. Con la evaluación de la alternativa 1 se determinó que colocar las alcantarillas a una mayor elevación para minimizar la excavación dentro de la llanura aluvial y el humedal no era viable debido a los problemas de elevación de la inundación. El tamaño y la elevación de la alcantarilla elegidos serán necesarios para mejorar la conducción del agua de las inundaciones y reducir el riesgo a los residentes de la zona. Respecto de la alternativa 2, dado que todas las alcantarillas y vados del Arroyo Tinsley se ubican en el aliviadero, no hay ubicaciones alternativas para el proyecto fuera de la llanura aluvial. Se determinó que el predio del proyecto seleccionado proveerá el máximo beneficio a los residentes que viven en la zona del Proyecto. La alternativa 3 relativa a no actuar evitaría el reemplazo de las alcantarillas y vados de la zona del proyecto, lo que ocasionaría que los residentes de la zona corrieran un mayor riesgo de daños por inundación en sus casas y comercios, si hubiera otra catástrofe. Por consiguiente, la alternativa de no actuar no aborda la necesidad de mejorar la resistencia contra las inundaciones.

La construcción del Proyecto fue la alternativa preferida porque no se prevé que agrave los

riesgos actuales para las llanuras aluviales o que altere de forma permanente los valores de la llanura aluvial o del humedal. En función de la revisión ambiental, el proyecto en su versión propuesta, con las prácticas óptimas de gestión adaptadas, no plantearía ningún riesgo significativo o condiciones adversas para las personas, el hábitat o la comunidad en esta ubicación. La Ciudad requerirá acatamiento de las normativas y prácticas de habilitación federales, estatales y locales. Estas incluyen, a título enunciativo pero no limitativo, la restricción de la colocación de vehículos y materiales en las zonas de llanura aluvial y humedal, y la protección de las llanuras aluviales y humedales mediante la colocación de cercas contra cieno y la gestión adecuada de los desperdicios y escombros de la construcción.

El presente aviso tiene tres objetivos principales. En primer lugar, las personas que pueden verse afectadas por las actividades en llanuras aluviales y humedales y aquellas interesadas en la protección del medio ambiente natural deberían recibir una oportunidad para expresar sus inquietudes y proveer información sobre estas zonas. En segundo lugar, un programa adecuado de aviso público puede ser una herramienta educativa para el público. La diseminación de información sobre llanuras aluviales y humedales puede facilitar y mejorar las campañas federales para reducir los riesgos asociados con la ocupación y la modificación de estas zonas particulares. En tercer lugar, como una cuestión de imparcialidad, cuando el gobierno federal decide que participará en medidas que se llevan a cabo en llanuras aluviales o humedales, debe informar a quienes podrían correr riesgos más grandes o continuos.

#### CONCLUSIÓN DE IMPACTO NO SIGNIFICATIVO

La Ciudad determinó que el proyecto no tendrá un impacto significativo en el ambiente humano. Por consiguiente, no se requiere la Declaración de Impacto Ambiental en virtud de la Ley Nacional de Política Ambiental de 1969 (NEPA). 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#### **COOKING WITH PARIND**

### Cardamom and saffron rice pudding

Hello everyone. My name is Parind Vora. I'm the chef/owner of Gonzales Bistro. In this column we talk cooking, tricks to cooking, and sometimes eating.

What to make with this crazy weather. If you plan on the rainy then it's hot. If you plan on a nice day, it's cold and

So, Let's chat a bit about what dish we can make that will work in both instances.

I've been craving a dessert that is hot, toothsome but rich....rice pudding. I can top it with whatever suits my mood AND the weather.

There is a trick to rice pudding so it does not become gruel.

That trick is to use a semifino rice. Like arborio or other risotto rice like Vialone Nano. They will hold their structure and absorb a lot of flavour. We will use a warming spice like cardamom and saffron to add exotic aroma and flavour but still keep all the stick to your rib rice 'puddingness'.

So ahora mismo!

#### **Ingredients:**

½ cup of water

1 cup of arborio rice

4 tablespoons of butter

8-10 cardamom seeds (1-2 green cardamom pods seeded)

1 small pinch saffron threads

1 can of sweet and condensed milk

1 cup of whole milk

Tiny pinch of salt

Small pinch of ultra-fine black pepper

Put the butter, cardamom, saffron, salt & pepper in a heavy bottomed pan that will hold at least 3 liters.

Add all of the arborio rice. Melt the butter slowly as the rice and the spices toast. Add the water once the butter is frothy and add both the milk. Cook slowly stirring often until the rice is cooked. Add water a little at a time as needed to keep it from drying out.

Serve this dish hot if it is rainy outside and cold if hot. You can serve it "family style" in a bowl or individually in sherbet glasses. Garnish with toasted

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shelled pistachios or serve "as is". Pay attention to its texture. Make sure its creamy and not dry regardless of hot or cold.

I would serve this with a slightly chilled French Quarts de Chaume chenin blanc or a fruity syrah from Australia called Shiraz.

transparency advocates to ensure the rights of all information requestors are safeguarded in the legislation.

Yet another bill, HB 3440 by Canales and Sen. Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, D-McAllen, adds to the public posting requirements for government meeting notices and agendas, stating that they must be posted on a government's website.

Among the other lawmakers working this session on transparency legislation were Rep. Todd Hunter, R-Corpus Christi; Sen. Lois Kolkhorst, R-Brenham; Rep. Dustin Burrows, R-Lubbock; Rep. Giovanni Capriglione, R-Southlake; Sen. Mayes Middleton, R-Galveston; and Rep. John Smithee, R-Amarillo.

The FOI Foundation of Texas and numerous organizations and lawmakers also succeeded in opposing a proposal that would have removed key provisions of the state's anti-SLAPP statute, which protects free speech and is known as the Texas Citizens Participation Act.

"Fighting for open government and free speech requires a team approach," Shannon said. "We thank everyone who worked on these issues to benefit Texans now and for years to come."





An envelope sent from Gonzales to Houston in the latter days of the Civil War should fetch a nice price when it goes to auction later this month.

On June 21, 2023, H.R. Harmer Fine Stamp Auctions will be offering at public auction the ninth of ten installments of the "Erivan" Collection of United and Confederate States Postal History.

This collection represents one of the most comprehensive and important holdings of American postage stamps ever assembled, and its appearance at auction marks a watershed moment for the hobby of philately.

This "stamp" is actually an advertising label for the firm of Coleman & Law that the town used in place of postage stamps. John V. Law was the postmaster at the time and used his own labels presumably as a form of free advertising. There are only three genuine envelopes with the Gonzales Provisional stamp. This envelope has not been offered at auction since 1999 and is expected to bring in far more than the \$5,000 starting price, according to experts in the industry.

"This Gonzales provisional represents a very rare instance of a postmaster's ingenuity in a time of need," remarks Charles Epting, CEO of H.R. Harmer Fine Stamp Auctions. "It also gives you an appreciation of how the Civil War affected every corner of people's lives, including how they communicated with each other."

na Springs) on Spring Lake this Saturday, June 10 at 9 a.m.

Some 161 teams from all over the globe have signed up for this year's race, which traverses the San Marcos River to the Guadalupe River (the confluence of the two is in Gonzales) to Guadalupe Bay and then San Antonio Bay with a finish line some 260 miles away in Seadrift. The teams have until 1 p.m. Wednesday, June 14, to cross the finish line at Bill Sanders Memorial Park — just 100 hours total.

The primary requirement is a boat powered only by human muscle. Racers must take all equipment needed with them, receiving only water, ice and food along the way.

"Its reputation has grown worldwide. It's kind of on the bucket list for people to do, and so it's a very unique race," said TWS President Allen Spelce.

And because this is the 60th Texas Water Safari, the TWS board will be giving out one-time awards during the banquet to the 60th boat to finish, the 60th person to finish, the boat that finishes closest to 60 hours, the 1st 60-year-old man and woman to finish the race and possible others. Because, why not?

The Texas Water Safari is not just the race that takes place every year on the second weekend in June, but also includes a seminar in February, the Texas Water Marathon race in May and the Texas Jr. Water Safari in September.

Once again, heat and low waters will propose a challenge for paddlers this year, according to Spelce.

"If you haven't maintained your body that day, Saturday and Saturday night by getting proper, you know, hydration, electrolytes, food calories. Teams will typically start to crater or drop out Sunday morning, Sunday afternoon,"

Spelce said. Checkpoint 4, which for a long time was the Gonzales gravel bar (mile 85.79) to the Gonzales dam (mile 84.46). Paddlers have until 4 p.m. Sunday, June 11 to make this checkpoint. They will have a mandatory left portage at the dam to the checkpoint to be signed through by their crews. Boats will exit the river above the dam, take the portage and head down the path to put in below

the dam.
"There is a cable strung

Legend has it that in 1962, Frank Brown and Bill "Big Willie" George decided to take their V-bottom boat, without a motor, from San Marcos to Corpus Christi. They accomplished their mission in about thirty days and decided that other people should have the opportunity to experience the same journey. So, in 1963 they set up the first Texas Water Safari.

Today the Safari is a long, tough, non-stop marathon canoe-racing adventure, traversing 260 miles of challenging

rivers and bay. Many participants enter the race with no intention of winning, but with the goal of joining the elite group of finishers and earning the coveted Texas Water Safari finisher's patch.



## Shigellosis outbreak traced to restaurant in Hallettsville

#### FROM STAFF REPORTS

A Houston lawyer has filed a lawsuit against a Hallettsville restaurant, accusing them of being responsible for an outbreak of shigellosis that may have gotten more than 100 people sick during pre-graduation meals.

The Texas Department of State Health Services Public Health Region 8 (DSHS PHR 8) confirmed it is currently investigating an outbreak of shigellosis in Lavaca County dating back a day or two before the Memorial Day weekend.

This was just before graduation at a number of area high schools in Lavaca County, as well as neighboring Gonzales, DeWitt, Fayette and Colorado counties.

"DSHS PHR 8 is working to identify the source of the outbreak by interviewing individuals who have become sick and collecting food samples from a location where multiple individuals have eaten before becoming sick," DSHS announced in a press release.

said he is filing suit on behalf of his client, who was diagnosed with shigellosis after eating at Los Cabos San Lucas Mexican Grill in Hallettsville. At least two more lawsuits have been filed and others may be expected with dozens of people having gotten sick.

The restaurant put out a statement to the public following the outbreak.

"We would like to offer our apologies to our customers affected by last Thursday's dinner service," the statement read. "We have been working closely with our food suppliers, employees, and health inspectors on fixing the problem. The owner, Mr. Sanchez, voluntarily closed on Monday May 31, 2023 and immediately contacted health inspectors. Mr. Sanchez remained

closed and did not feel comfortable operating while not knowing what was causing the illness. "On Thursday June 1,

2023 health inspectors arrived at 9 a.m. and did a complete investigation. They inspected the entire facility top to bottom. As an extra precaution Mr. Sanchez disposed and discarded all food products and will be receiving all new food products early Friday morning June 2, 2023. This will allow his staff to prepare all food products fresh from scratch and be ready to reopen Friday, June 2, 2023 at 5 p.m.

"To the city of Hallettsville we thank you very much for your support and will continue working on maintaining great food safety standards at all of our establishments."

Shigellosis is an infection caused by ingesting shigella bacteria. The bacteria spread easily, and people can become infected by eating food prepared by someone with shigellosis, swallowing water while swimming in a lake or improperly treated swimming pool, or touching surfaces or items contaminated with the bacteria from someone with an infection.



in Community Service and Special Section and the oldest weekly newspaper in Texas closed out the TPA Convention at Kalahari Resorts in Round Rock as the most decorated newspaper in the Lone Star State — regardless of size.

The Inquirer collected a total of 1,000 Sweepstakes points, the only newspaper in the state of Texas to hit that threshold and had more points than the next three newspapers in Division 7 combined.

In doing so, the Inquirer made good on an aspiration that I had the moment last year's convention in San Marcos ended. I even made the prediction in our Aug. 5, 2022, edition.

"The Gonzales Inquirer will be celebrating its 170th anniversary next year as the oldest continuously published weekly newspaper in the state," Cohn said in 2022. "Our goal for next year's Texas Press Association contest is to win the Sweepstakes Award and build off the success we had this year."

What makes this win even more impressive is that it was achieved by a skeleton crew of employees who put their hearts and souls into producing the best newspaper in Texas, despite the devastating loss of our beloved advertising sales executive and sports writer Louis Decker last July. Some of Decker's final work with the Inquirer was part of the entries which won first place for Sports Coverage and first place in Advertising.

The judges from the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Association had plenty of great things to say about the Inquirer.

The judges praised the Inquirer for its Editorial Writing, which included entries about the newspaper's political coverage policies and an editorial explaining county property tax increases.

"Readers may disagree with the newspaper's polices on political coverage, but it's smart and good to show those boundaries. And explaining property taxes and the like is not easy, but this is well done," the judges wrote.

Feature photography included Vandy Van Epps' spectacular work in showcasing Float Fest as well as the newspaper's graduation photo pages, which judges called "lovely. Nice emotion and some nice light."

In General Excellence, the judges found the Inquirer to be "visually very pleasing. Nice photos (looks like there's a lot of reader buy in, i.e. back to school, but just lots of faces all the way through), good variety of content. Really nice page design overall."

The 2022 Texas Better Newspaper Contest featured 18 categories. Participating newspapers were invited to submit entries from work published during the calendar year 2022. This year, 99 newspapers submitted 920 entries in the contest.

Division 1 was reserved for the five metro dailies with the highest circulation in Texas, which complete only in the General Excellence category. Division 2 is designated for dailies; Divisions 3, 4 and 5 for semiweeklies (newspapers publishing two or three times per week) and Divisions 6 through 10 for weeklies.

This year, eight dailies competed in Division 2; 31 semiweekly newspapers competed in Divisions 3, 4 and 5; and 53 weekly newspapers competed in divisions 6 through 10.

Competitions were divided into divisions in which newspapers competed against publications of similar circulation.

TPA member newspapers competing in each division had the opportunity to

submit entries in 12 sweepstakes contest categories and six non-sweepstakes contest categories.

In the sweepstakes contest categories, awards were presented in all eight circulation divisions.

In the non-sweepstakes categories, divisions were determined by the number of entries from dailies, semiweeklies and weeklies. This year there were three divisions in the Community Service, Best Website, Online Coverage, Best Magazine and Public Notice competition categories; and five divisions in the Special Section category.

Entries were judged this year by members of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Association while Texas Press Association member volunteers judged entries in the ONPA contest.

First place winners and sweepstakes winners receive plaques and certificates are awarded in first through fourth places.

Sweepstakes points are earned for each division (except Division 1) based on point accumulation in the 12 sweepstakes categories: 100 points for each first-place award, 75 points for each second-place award, 50 points for each third-place award and 25 points for each fourth-place award.

Awards were presented on June 3, at the 2023 TPA Convention & Trade Show in Round Rock.

seasons, because we'll have an influx. Right now, we're in the thick of the kitten season, and then we'll have another kitten season in September. It's a big job to take care of

strays," Weaver said. Finding volunteers has been challenge for FOGAS, and Weaver said the organization has been doing that on a daily basis, but most people want a salary.

"It probably has to be people that are retired that can do this just

because their hearts in it. And it's a pretty thankless job and an unending job," Weaver said.

In 2022, FOGAS reported that 500 plus cats were rescued by fostering, adoption, Barn Tiger Program and TNR Rehoming; 90 dogs and 135 cats in community-owned areas were neutered at no cost.

Weaver said there are some in the community who think cats should not be part of the community, but she added if you live in a community with neighbors, the cat are part of it.

"It is part of living in a community that there will be stray cats. And a lot of people don't like

that. But you would be trapping hundreds and hundreds and hundreds of animals every year to eliminate cats in a community and with this climate that we live in, you're not gonna stop it," Weaver said.

FOGAS hopes that a new contractor will be another rescue group, and stated whoever it is, they are committed to provide the support they can make for a smooth transition.


Gonzales City Manager Tim Crow said they appreciated FOGAS and their work for many

area." Crow said. With the group not renewing its contract with the city, Crow is looking at different possibilities for the cat shelter; options include adding an animal control officer to help facilitate the cat shelter or have another non-profit group to make

a proposal, he said. "We're in the very early stages of planning for that; this change will happen at the end of September, beginning of October. And so we're just in the very beginning steps of putting that plan together," Crow said.

Development Area. For the entire Golden Crescent Workforce Development Area, the unemployment rate for April 2023 was 3.4 percent, a drop of four-tenths of a percent and lower than the state average of 3.7 percent. This represented a total of 3,167 residents in Gonzales, Calhoun, DeWitt, Goliad, Jackson, Lavaca and Victoria counties seeking employment out of a total workforce of 92,351 people.

The counties in the Golden Crescent with the lowest unemployment rate were DeWitt and Calhoun at 3.0 percent each, followed by Jackson County at 3.1 percent, both Gonzales and Lavaca counties at 3.2 percent, with Goliad County at 3.6 percent and Victoria County bringing up the rear at 3.8 percent.

For April 2023, there were 303 individuals in Gonzales County seeking employment out of a workforce of 9,559 with 9,256 reported as employed.

moral turpitude."

"All members shall be registered voters of the city of Nixon, having primary or secondary residence within the city limits of the city of Nixon," La Fleur said. "All current appointed members must comply within six months, and all future members must meet requirements to be considered for the position at the time of appointment.

"We have one proposed member and one current member that we're going to give them time to comply with their residency issue. And going forward, those will be the residency requirements."

The council approved the elected officers of Chairman Travis Hansen, Vice Chairman Briana Dominguez, Secretary Pablo Aguirre, Treasurer Nina Hernandez and Sergeant-at-Arms Mark Soto.

When it came time to discuss whether the name of the board should be changed, however, Escobedo told council members that using the name district would essentially create a separate taxing entity that would take away money from the city.

"When a district is created, it's its own taxing entity," Escobedo said. "So, it would impose such taxes, you know, on the citizens as well. Basically, the way that is done is a percentage of the tax income that's received by the city is taken away and put in for funding for the district. And again, that would potentially affect the budget."

The issue of creating an economic development district (EDC) has come up previously, but because of the city's limited budget and sales tax income,

it was not approved. Escobedo said for an EDC to be approved, it would have to go before the voters.

"The reason for that is because of the taxation issue," Escobedo said. "Any board

that's created that has the word district in it is creating its own taxing entity and that affects the citizens and affects the budget of the city. So therefore, we have to get basically a majority of vote on yes or no, on an election

to be able to do that. And it has to be held in a regularly scheduled election date."

Escobedo said the intent of the city was not to create a district, but to "create and advisory board so that way, the city council still maintains control of what's recommended by the

"If it's a district, that control is essentially lost," he continued. "The only control that city council would have, according to the code, is to select who the board members are and that's it. And again, the reason that it's advisory in nature is because it's basically a volunteer-type position to give advice to city council on making decisions moving forward. Ultimately, the intent was to keep the control of decisions regarding that particular board here in city council."


Hansen responded by saying that none of the members of the board want to take control over the decision-making process.

"I think we wanted to keep our hands out of that," Hansen said. "We just want to take some of the legwork off and bring ideas to y'all. And y'all can either shoot them down or say, yeah, keep getting after it. It's not our job to make decisions on behalf of the city."

Council members then voted unanimously to keep the name of the group as the Tourism and Development Board as they were created to be advisory in nature.

The council also had discussions with the board about the proposed veterans park that would be built next to City Hall. A full story on that portion of the meeting will appear in next week's Inquirer.
