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## Early voting for GISD, Waelder bond issues begins Monday

Ballot also contains 14 constitutional amendment propositions

Early voting begins this coming Monday, Oct. 23, and continues through

Friday, Nov. 3 for the Nov. 7 general election, which features bond issues at two local school districts as well as 14 constitutional amendments approved earlier this year by the Texas Legislature.

The second, Proposition B, is for \$44.48 million, will fund a new athletic complex featuring a 7,000-seat lighted artificial turf football and soccer stadium as well as new facilities for tennis, baseball, softball and track and

## **Gonzales Health System hosts Pink Out luncheon**

The Gonzales Health System hosted its annual Pink Out Luncheon Thursday, Oct. 12 at the THRIVE Center.

Many organizations around the community gathered, attired in all pink, for Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

"We are so grateful that you are here with us as we gather to raise funds for one of the most cherished causes within our Foundation — the unfunded mammography program," said Holly Danz, GHS Director of Marketing.

The program started several years ago with the purpose to allow women, and also men, to receive their annual mammography screening for those who can't afford it, Danz said.

"If we have learned anything about breast cancer over the years, it's that early detection is key to treating it. And no one should go without this essential, and potentially life-saving, screening if they don't have to," Danz said.

In 2019, GHS was able to pay for 75 mammogram screenings; last year they paid for 200 screenings.

Every year the Gonzales Health System partners with the Gonzales ISD cheerleaders to sell Pink Out shirts and host other functions in the month of October, with all the funds going towards the foundation.

## **Gonzales CTE** expanding beyond its available space

Gonzales High School's Career & Technical Education (CTE) department has been providing students the skills they need to further their posthigh-school career.

Jennifer Ervin is the CTE coordinator at the high school and she went over the 13 different programs the school offers.

"We have your welding, your cosmetology, culinary, floral design, graphic, audio visual education, multiple programs of studies for students to pursue as they work toward their career goals," Ervin said.

The benefit of the CTE programs is it'll help students who are not sure what career path they want to follow, Ervin said.

"It's also very beneficial because there's a lot of kids that maybe don't want to go to college or, you know, they're not sure about trade school. So by going through these programs successfully completing them, they have the opportunity to earn a certification and it's a stepping stone into the work-

force," Ervin said. The CTE program has impacted many students that have gone through it, and Ervin said that former students have reached out about the CTE and how they met their career goals, whether they've gone to college or are now working for the school district.

"Some are off going to be doctors and lawyers and all that kind of stuff. But then you've got kids and I'll just speak with my own child that graduated



## Plant onions in November, potatoes in January

Q. I planted tomatoes this fall in August, but they became infected with spider mites. I should have pulled them but did not and now with the cool weather are growing aggressively out of the top of the plant. The tops look good and even have set some fruit. Do I dare let them continue their recovery?

A The conservative answer is to yank and discard the infected plants. That is certainly the best answer if you have other tomatoes or plants that are not infected but are susceptible. I agree it would be interesting to see if the plants can take advantage of the weather change and recover but spider mites usually eliminate the production of current plants and even the next generation unless they are

Q. You have not said much about purple martins this year. Did anyone have a successful breeding year?

A. I definitely did not because of the challenging weather, and I let the wildflowers and brush dominate my landscape. Other bird species such as the lesser goldfinches and buntings responded well but the martins seem to demand a more open golf course like setting. Next year I am going to try a compromise of less brush and a more open landscape. One other gardener reported he was challenged by the weather and then the hawks but still had a good martin representation for the year.

Q. Tell us again where we can obtain the blue curl seed. My nephew swears by its attractiveness to pollinators early in the year before the zinnias and mist flower bloom.

A. It is also a wildflower that blooms in the sun or shade and is very attractive. Apparently Native

American Seed Company( www. seedsource.com) in Junction TX is the only source of the seed. Obtain and plant it now. Next year make sure your nephew saves you some seed!

### Q. When can we plant onions and potatoes? Where can the onion transplants and seed potatoes be found?

A. Onions are usually planted in November and potatoes at the end of January. Your favorite nursery should carry both but give them a phone call now to make sure that that is the plan and there is a close source. Another option is to buy your broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, Brussels sprouts, kale, collards, and Swiss chard now along with the carrot, lettuce, turnip, beet, radish and lettuce seed. Ask the nursery about the potatoes and onions.

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


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### **LETTER TO THE EDITOR**

### Dear editor,

I write to you today as a concerned citizen who believes that it is our collective responsibility to address the issues plaguing our law enforcement agencies. While I acknowledge that policing is a vital aspect of maintaining order and safety in our communities, I am deeply troubled by the current state of affairs, especially concerning the violations of citizens' Fourth Amendment rights.

One of the most alarming aspects of policing today is the frequent violation of citizens' Fourth Amendment rights, which protect against unreasonable searches and seizures. Far too often, we witness instances where police officers issue unlawful commands, knowing that the public will often comply to avoid confrontation, even though legally they are not required to do so.

For example, citizens may be asked to consent to a search of their vehicle during a routine traffic stop, despite there being no reasonable suspicion of wrongdoing. In such cases, individuals often feel pressured to comply, even when they are well within their rights to refuse. This not only erodes the principles of individual liberty but also sets a dangerous precedent where citizens' rights are sacrificed for the sake of appeasing law enforcement.

Another troubling scenario involves warrantless home searches, where officers may demand entry without a valid search warrant or exigent circumstances. In these cases, citizens may feel compelled to allow entry, believing that refusal could lead to adverse consequences. These unwarranted intrusions into private residences represent a blatant disregard for Fourth Amendment protections.


Moreover, the rampant use of stop-and-frisk practices in certain communities has raised concerns about racial profiling and the infringement of personal privacy. These stops often lack the necessary reasonable suspicion required by law and disproportionately affect marginalized communities. The result is a breach of trust and an erosion of the rights of citizens.


To address these issues and rebuild trust between law enforcement and the communities they serve, we must prioritize the education of both officers and citizens about their rights. Additionally, introducing third-party oversight mechanisms for complaints and reevaluating qualified immunity are crucial steps toward achieving accountability.

In conclusion, the need for reform within our policing system is urgent and undeniable, especially regarding the protection of citizens' Fourth Amendment rights. Our society deserves a police force that not only respects the Constitution but also respects the rights and dignity of all citizens. It is only through meaningful changes, such as the introduction of third-party investigations, the removal of qualified immunity, and enhanced education on citizens' rights for all officers, that we can hope to restore the trust between the police and the communities they are sworn to protect. It is high time that we prioritize the welfare and rights of our citizens above all

## **U.S. BILL OF RIGHTS**

The following text is a transcription of the enrolled original of the Joint Resolution of Congress proposing the Bill of Rights, which is on permanent display in the Rotunda at the National Archives Museum. The spelling and punctuation reflects the original.

## Amendments IV - VII

### Amendment IV

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses,  $papers, \, and \, effects, \, against \, unreasonable \, searches \, and \,$ seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of War or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offence to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law;  $nor\,shall\,private\,property\,be\,taken\,for\,public\,use,\,without\,just$ 

Amendment VI In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the

field, concessions and ADA-compliant bleachers, partial locker rooms, rest-rooms, parking and scoreboards, all to be built on the land off Stieren Road as well.

#### **WAELDER ISD**

On the ballot at Waelder ISD will be two propositions totaling just under \$7 million more than \$3.3 million less than the district sought in its last failed attempt in May.

Proposition A, which would call for the issuance of \$5.826 million, would have four main components:

- Remodeling the existing old gym, which cannot be used as a gym and is currently being used as storage, into a cafetorium that would seat all students in two lunch periods, provide a stage for the district for fine arts and theatre arts, and an auditorium for school and community functions.
- Renovations and improvements to the Middle School that includes replacement of 17-year-old carpet, replacing leaking windows, providing a monitored fire alarm system, and other renovations and improvements.
- Classrooms for fifth and sixth grade students that would provide permanent classrooms, eliminate portable buildings, and save the district the annual cost of renting portable buildings, a savings of \$76,222 per year.
- · High school upgrades that include replacing 13-year-old carpet, provide an entrance safety vestibule, more efficient lighting, and interior and exterior painting, and other

building improvements.

Proposition B, for \$1.1 million, calls for renovating the open pavilion into a climatecontrolled gymnasium that will serve as many as 14 different student groups that utilize gym facilities in the district. Total cost of the project is \$2.1 million, with the district using current tax maintenance notes to pay \$1 million toward the project.

#### **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS**

Fourteen amendments to the Texas Constitution are being proposed on the Nov. 7 ballot. Some, like Proposition 4, would raise the homestead exemption for homeowners from \$40,000 to \$100,000, while others would create tax exemptions for child-care facilities (Prop 2) or medical or biomedical equipment (Prop 10) or ban the imposition of so-called "wealth taxes" without voter approval (Prop 3) or make it tougher to restrict farming, ranching, timber and horticulture in certain areas (Prop 1).

Others would create or alter funds to support higher education research (Prop 5), water infrastructure (Prop 6), natural gas-fueled power plants (Prop 7), broadband infrastructure (Prop 8) and maintenance and creation of state parks (Prop 14).

There are also amendments that would raise the mandatory retirement age for judges (Prop 13) and provide a cost-of-living adjustment for retired teachers (Prop 9) as well as specific amendments which impact El Paso County parks and recreation and the Galveston County treasurer's office.

dropped by more than \$20,000 from October 2022 to October 2023 — a decrease of more than 7 percent. Even Waelder, which had been seeing significant increases in its sales tax collections, experienced a cooling off in October with a decrease of 8.34 percent from the prior year.

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose districts \$1.1 billion in local sales tax allocations for October, 4.5 percent more than in October 2022.

These allocations are based on sales made in August by businesses that report tax monthly.

M - F: 8 a.m. - 5 p.m.

For the month of October 2023, Gonzales County municipalities received a combined \$308,132.34 in sales tax allocations, down some \$25,331.84 or just under 7.6 percent below the \$333,464.18 received during October 2022.

For the year, county municipalities have received \$3,142,275.54, up \$94,479.63 or 3.1 percent, above the \$3,047,795.91 received through the first ten months of 2022.

Sales tax allocations for Gonzales, the largest city in the county which generates the lion's share of sales tax revenue, were \$265,229.51, down \$20,511.09 or 7.17 percent below the \$285,740.60 received during October 2022.

For the year, the city has received \$2,663,084.45, up \$21,290.41 or 0.80 percent, above the \$2,641,794.04 received at this same point in 2022.

Waelder received a total of \$10,296.88, down 8.34 percent or \$937.17, below the \$11,234.05 received in October 2022. For the year, Waelder has received \$115,732.13, up \$47,133.70, or 68.7 percent, above the \$68,598.43 received at this point in 2022. The city has smashed the record \$84,776.57 it received in all of 2022 and still has allocations coming in November and December.

Sales tax receipts for Nixon were \$30,404.90, down \$3,458.74, or 10.21 percent, below the \$33,863.64 received in October 2022. For the year, the city has received \$331,826.18, up \$22,636.14, or 7.32 percent, above the \$309,190.04 received at this same point

Finally, Smiley's sales tax receipts were \$2,201.05, down \$64.84, or 2.86 percent, from the \$2,265.89 received in October 2022. For the year, the city has received \$31,632.78, up \$3,419.38 or 12.11 percent above the \$28,213.40 received in the first ten months of 2022.

Three cities in Gonzales County — Gonzales, Nixon and Waelder - collect a 1.5 percent sales tax rate, while Smiley collects a 1 percent sales tax.



## **Apaches learn a lot from 56-7** home loss to state-ranked Cuero

One old football adage says that "you learn more from a loss than you do from a win." If that holds true, then the Gonzales Apaches learned a great deal from their 56-7 loss to No. 3 Cuero at Apache Field on Friday, Oct. 13.

"That's what I talked about with the team — if you don't learn from the loss, then you've really lost if you don't learn from it, and we got to learn some things," said Head Coach Joey Rivera. "They are the number three team in the state for reason. They're a very good football team and you can't make mistakes against them. And we made a few and the game got away from us pretty quick."

Statistics will say this was a game dominated by the Gobblers. They racked up 478 yards of total offense, including 309 on the ground, while holding the Apaches to just 134 total yards of offense. Cuero outscored Gonzales, 35-7, in the first half and 21-0 in the second half.

However, the Apaches should take away from this loss that they do have the ability to play toe-totoe with great teams, provided they don't gift field position to their opponents. Half of Cuero's scores came with starting field position on Gonzales' side of the field following turnovers or special teams miscues. Also, Gonzales was able to hold Cuero defensively to a single touchdown each in both the first and third

"Defensively, I thought even

though they've put up some points, you know, we gave them a lot of short fields for them to score on early on," Rivera said. "They had a receiver last week go for 280 yards receiving, so he was really on our minds. They've got a very dominant offensive line and they kind of just took over on the

Daylon Gibbs, a senior Cuero receiver, had caught six passes for 281 yards and two TDs against Giddings the previous week. The Apaches held Gibbs to five catches for 59 yards and a 24-yard TD reception.

Senior quarterback Mason Notaro and senior running back Kenneth Jackson were the biggest thorns in Gonzales' side on Friday night. Notaro completed 14-of-19 passes for 169 yards and three scores, but was picked off in the first quarter by Gonzales' Brandon DuBose, who stopped

a potential scoring drive for the Gobblers by making a perfect read on Notaro. Notaro also ran for 40 yards on seven carries.

Against Giddings, Notaro had gone 9-for-14 for 211 yards and a TD while rushing three times for 20 yards.

Jackson rushed 13 times for 142 yards and two TDs against Gonzales. He didn't play against Giddings, but had rushed 19 times for 238 yards and three TDs against Beeville Jones two weeks prior.

Propostion A: safety and security enhancements, general renovations and improvements to address aging buildings and infrastructure at Gonzales High School, Gonzales Junior High, Gonzales Primary Academy, Gonzales North Avenue, Gonzales Elementary, Administration, Maintenance, address accessibility and lifecycle projects, the construction of a new career and technical education building new agricultural barn.

Proposition B: 7,000 seat artificial turf lighted stadium, 8-lane track, concessions, partial locker rooms, restrooms, parking, scoreboard, field events, baseball/softball artificial turf, lighted, bleachers concession, 8 lighted tennis courts, weight room.

Voters can either vote for both propositions, one of them or neither in the Nov. 7 election.

## **FINAL MEETING**

Members of the community at Baker Boys BBQ showed both their support for the bonds and concerns about it.

Some of the concerns were a lack of plans being visible on the website,

where the money is going for these projects and how the taxes will impact the community.

Gonzales High School teacher Billy Holifield showed his support for both bond propositions and students in the district.

"Part of the reason that you need a new CTE center and a new school and all that kind of stuff is because it provides better opportunities for the kids. It will allow more opportunities in different areas for the school to be able to bring in," Holifield said.

"As a community, you have an opportunity right now to give back to the community that you all say you love. And more importantly, you have an opportunity to provide for the kids that are in school and the kids that are coming up. You have a shot to make it better for them. Sometimes you have to jump out there on a leap of faith," Holifeild said.

Pastor David Schautteet grew up in Gonzales and played on Apache Field 18 years ago, he said, adding during those 18 years what has been done on that field.

Schautteet listed the schools in the last 18 years that have made stadium improvements, including Luling, Hallettsvilles, Cuero, and Yoakum.

"Has anybody been outside of Gonzales to go support the Apaches and walked around the facilities that other people have? And go ask those people what they had to do to get that, they had to make a sacrifice, you have to make choice," Schautteet said.

"In our minds, we cannot continue to live in the past. God tells us to move forward. Don't dwell on the things in the past, but move forward," Schauteet

"We're not saying we don't want to do something," said City Councilmember Ronda Miller, who questioned the cost of the bond issue and the impact it would have financially. "We're not for this plan, because it's an enormous amount of money. We're all here for the kids but we don't think this plan is the best plan. Bring us something with less money, bring us something in writing and then we might get behind it."

## What's on the ballot

### BY THE TEXAS TRIBUNE

Each item on the ballot was approved by the Texas Legislature earlier this year.

**Proposition 1** – *HJR* 126 "The constitutional amendment protecting the right to engage in farming, ranching, timber production, horticulture, and wildlife management."

What it means: With Texas cities continuing to grow, this amendment would raise the bar for state and local regulation of generally accepted farming and ranching practices. It would require for state and local governments to provide evidence that the regulation is needed to protect the public from danger. For example, it would prevent a city from banning farming in an area for no specific reason, but it would allow for a government to require ranchers to put up fences for their livestock, according to the Texas Farm Bureau, which supports the amendment. The amendment would not affect state or local government efforts needed to preserve or conserve natural resources, such as water, fish, wildlife and trees. Nor would it affect state actions needed to protect animal health and crop production. Agriculture Commissioner Sid Miller said "municipal encroachment will no longer threaten the livelihoods' of farmers and ranchers if the amendment passes. Jayme Lozano Carver and María Méndez

**Proposition 2** – *SJR* 64 "The constitutional amendment authorizing a local option exemption from ad valorem taxation by a county or municipality of all or part of the appraised value of real property used to operate a child-care facility." What it means.

resolution would allow cities and counties to exempt child care providers from property taxes for any facilities used to run a child care business. The value of the exemption would have to be at least 50 percent of the property's appraised value.

The amendment would offer relief for child care businesses that have been struggling to stay open since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic. With federal pandemic relief money set to dry up for child care businesses, some providers are preparing to close in the next

Supporters of the resolution argue that keeping child care businesses open is a win for the economy. The U.S. Chamber of Commerce Foundation found that the Texas economy loses nearly \$9.4 billion a year from breakdowns in child care. Critics say property tax exemptions will result in higher tax burdens for homeowners and other businesses, who will have to pay more to make up for the lost revenue. — Sneha Dey

**Proposition 3** – HJR 132 "The constitutional *amendment prohibiting* the imposition of an individual wealth or net worth tax, including a tax on the difference between the assets and liabilities of an individual or family."

What it means: Several states have proposed socalled "wealth taxes" in recent months, referring to a tax on a person based on the market value of assets they own, which can include real property and retirement accounts, minus their debts or liabilities, such as bankruptcies. Texas has not introduced this and does not have a

Supporters of those taxes argue that the impact on the extremely wealthy would be minimal, that the definition of "wealth" can be defined in a way that best suits each state, and that it would help pay for costly programs without impacting lower income people. Critics say raising taxes on someone's wealth discourages business and that the revenue from it will be less than anticipated. They also say that overall wealth would decline, which would result in less investment and loss of tax revenue from other sources, such as sales and property taxes.

This amendment would force lawmakers to ask voters for authorization before they could impose any new state taxes on residents that would be based on net worth or wealth. — Karen Brooks

**Proposition 4** – HJR2 "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to establish a temporary limit on the maximum appraised value of real property other than a residence homestead for ad valorem tax purposes; to increase the amount of the exemption from ad valorem taxation by a school district applicable to residence homesteads from \$40,000 to \$100,000; to adjust the amount of the limitation on school district ad valorem taxes imposed on the residence homesteads of the elderly or disabled to reflect increases in certain exemption amounts; to except certain appropriations to pay for ad valorem tax relief from

the constitutional limitation on the rate of growth of appropriations; and to authorize the legislature to provide for a four-year term of office for a member of the board of directors of certain appraisal districts."

What it means: Texas has some of the highest property taxes in the nation. Earlier this year, Texas lawmakers approved a \$12.7 billion package of property tax cuts that needs voter approval in order to take effect.

The package would send \$7.1 billion to school districts so they can lower their property tax rates. School district taxes make up the bulk of a Texas property owner's tax bill. The amendment would also raise the state's school district homestead exemption — or the slice of a home's value that can't be taxed to pay for public schools — from \$40,000 to \$100,000, at a cost of \$5.6 billion.

The amendment also includes other tax reforms, including a temporary limit on appraisals for commercial, mineral and residential properties that don't receive a homestead exemption that are worth less than \$5 million. If voters approve the idea, appraisal districts could not raise the taxable value of those properties by more than 20% each year for the next three years. The limit would expire in 2026 unless lawmakers and voters decide to extend it.

The amendment would also expand the pool of businesses that don't have to pay the state's franchise tax — and allow voters to elect three members to their local appraisal district's board of directors, which are currently appointed. — Joshua Fechter

**Proposition 5** – HJR*3 "The constitutional* amendment relating to the Texas University Fund. which provides funding to certain institutions of higher education to achieve national prominence as major research universities and drive the state economy."

What it means: If passed, the amendment would rename the National Research University Fund to the Texas University Fund. The university fund would gain the annual interest income, dividends and investment earnings from Texas' rainy day fund to support research at state universities. Total money moved to the university fund in the 2024 fiscal year would be limited to \$100 million. The annual amount may be adjusted for inflation and is limited to a 2% growth rate. The Texas A&M and University of Texas systems will not receive money from the fund as they receive research funds from a separate Permanent University Fund.

House Bill 1595 will also take effect if the amendment is passed, requiring the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to determine which universities are eligible and the size of each deposit. The fund will be managed by the comptroller and the Texas Treasury Safekeeping Trust Company. — Caroline Wilburn

**Proposition 6** – *SJR* 75 "The constitutional *amendment creating the* Texas water fund to assist in financing water projects in this state."

What it means: If approved, this resolution would create a new special fund in the state treasury outside of the general revenue fund. endowed with a \$1 billion down payment. The fund would be administered by the Texas Water Development Board to support a wide range of projects including fixing Texas' aging, deteriorating pipes, acquiring more water sources and mitigating water loss.

A portion of the fund would have to be used for water infrastructure projects in rural areas as well as for water conservation strategies and water loss projects. At least 25% of the fund would be used for the New Water Supply Fund for Texas, which will support projects to increase the state's water supply through, for example, marine desalination and treating "produced water," which comes from the ground during the oil fracking process.

The new fund would be created Jan. 1, 2024. — Pooja Salhotra

**Proposition 7** – SJR 93 "The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the Texas energy fund to support the construction, maintenance, modernization, and operation of electric generating facilities."

What it means: If approved, this resolution would create a state fund allowing officials to distribute loans and grants to companies with the aim of building new natural gas-fueled power plants. This would include giving a 3% interest loan for the construction of or upgrades to gas-fueled power plants on the state's main electric grid and paying a bonus for getting new plants connected by June 2029.

The Legislature set aside \$5 billion to fund these programs for the next two years. Supporters say more gas-fueled power is needed because it can come on any time, unlike wind and solar power that depend on the wind to blow and the sun to shine to operate. Still, gas-fueled power plants are not always reliable and emit greenhouse gasses, which are driving climate change. — Emily **Foxhall** 

**Proposition 8** – *HJR* 125 "The constitutional amendment creating the broadband infrastructure fund to expand high-speed broadband access and assist in the financing of connectivity projects.'

What it means: Texas lawmakers made an investment in broadband development by passing a bill which would create the Texas broadband infrastructure fund pending approval of this resolution.

With the passage of this

resolution, \$1.5 billion

would be allocated to

expand internet availability in Texas, where some 7 million people currently lack access. These dollars would help pay to develop and finance broadband and telecommunications services as well as 911 services. The fund will also provide matching funds with federal money from the Broadband Equity, Access and Deployment Program. — Pooja Salhotra

Proposition 9 - HJR 2 "The constitutional amendment authorizing the 88th Legislature to provide a cost-of-living adjustment to certain annuitants of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

What it means: During the regular session, lawmakers passed Senate Bill 10, which would provide some retired Texas teachers with cost-of-living raises to their monthly pension checks. For some, this is the first raise they will see in almost 20 years.

But to afford these raises, lawmakers need to ask voters to allow them to use \$3.3 billion from the general revenue fund and move it to the retired teachers fund. — Brian Lopez

**Proposition 10** – *SJR* 87 "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation equipment or inventory held by a manufacturer of medical or biomedical products to protect the Texas healthcare network and strengthen our medical supply chain."

What it means: School districts, cities and counties are currently allowed to collect property taxes on the value of equipment and inventory that are held by the manufacturers of medical or biomedical products, such as pharmaceuticals, personal protective equipment stocks, and medical

This amendment would exempt those from a facility's overall property values, leading to a potential decrease in their taxes. The new exemption would cost districts some \$207 million in estimated revenue over the next five years, according to a financial analysis.

Supporters of the exemption say that it will encourage more manufacturers in the industry to locate in Texas, lower healthcare costs and strengthen the medical supply chain. Detractors say that school districts are already strapped for money and that the same goals can be achieved without lowering their revenue. They also point out that the amendment doesn't keep taxing entities from raising tax rates to make up for the loss. — Karen Brooks Harper

Propositions 11 and 12 are specific to El Paso County and Galveston County, respectively.

**Proposition 11** – *SJR* 32 "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit conservation and reclamation districts in El Paso County to issue bonds supported by ad valorem taxes to fund the development and maintenance of parks and recreational facilities."

What it means: Eleven counties' conservation and reclamation districts are currently permitted to issue bonds supported by property taxes to fund recreational development and improvement. This proposed amendment would add El Paso County to the list.

Conservation and reclamation districts aid in managing stormwater

storage, land irrigation and the conservation and development of forests within their designated boundaries. Critics of the amendment say it could cause property taxes to increase for El Paso County residents. — Ali Juell

**Proposition 12** – HJR 134 "The constitutional amendment providing for the abolition of the office of county treasurer in Galveston County."

What it means: If passed by a majority of Texans and Galveston County residents, this amendment would abolish Galveston County's office of the county treasurer, an office that exists in other counties.

The office's current role is to act as a bank for the county, which includes overseeing county investments, maintaining records of deposits and withdrawals and ensuring the safety of county funds. The Commissioner's Court of Galveston County would be allowed to employ or contract an existing county official or other qualified person to complete tasks previously under the office.

Galveston County's current treasurer, Hank Dugie, ran on eliminating the position and said in his campaign video the office is, "redundant and a waste of more than half a million dollars each year." The County Treasurers Association of Texas opposes the proposition, however, arguing that such a change won't save money and that having an independently elected treasurer — rather than an employee of the commissioners court — ensures a separation of powers in the county and creates a system that lets a treasurer "challenge the commissioners' court if they question the legality and propriety of a payment order." — Ali Juell

**Proposition 13** – *HJR* 107 "The constitutional amendment to increase the mandatory age of retirement for state justices and judges."

What it means: Voters will decide if state judges can retire at 79, instead of the current mandatory retirement age of 75. Proposition 13 would also increase the minimum retirement age from 70 to 75 for state judges.

Legal groups advocating for the change argued that more people are working later into their careers than previous generations. Supporters say extending this mandatory retirement age will minimize judicial turnover by keeping elected public servants, who are willing to do this work, on the bench. — William Melhado

**Proposition 14** – *SJR* 74 "The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the centennial parks conservation fund to be used for the creation and improvement of state parks."

What it means: Texas ranks 35th in the nation for state park acreage per capita, according to a report by Environment Texas. This pressured lawmakers to propose investing more than \$1 billion for state parks, which advocates said would create "a new golden age" for the park system. The funding would go to buying more land for the state parks system, which celebrates its 100th anniversary this year. — Alejandra Mar-

last year. He is at TSTC working on a welding certification. And he comes home and he's got a job offer already as soon as he completes his welding program up there because of what he learned over here at the welding shop," Ervin said.

A \$95.08 million bond election is around the corner for GISD, and one of the two bond propositions that Gonzales residents will vote on is a potential new CTE building.

Ervin was excited of the possibilities of having a new potential CTE building for the high school. She said she has done a lot of traveling and seen many CTE campuses.

"I just toured a facility not too long ago, and it's 20 years old. It's not brand spanking new, but they have the space in the facility. They have a vet tech program," Ervin said.

One of the biggest concerns in the CTE program is facing is space, Ervin said.

"We cannot always buy the state of the art equipment, because we don't have the facilities, the infrastructure, the electrical setup, plumbing issues, and mainly just space, so a new building would allow us to have the space and the facilities that we need to give the kids the state of the art equipment to learn these programs," Ervin said.

The high school has 10 wielding booths and the programs runs 147 students day, Ervin said.

"Our eighth period class, when we have two teachers who have a block class, we have 47 students in that club in

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that shop that's designed for maybe 15-16 max, so we have to share, and while my teachers don't mind sharing, our kids are not getting the full benefit of the program," Ervin said.

"Spacing is one of the biggest issues that we face. If it comes down to it, we'll have to do a lotto system for students to get into these programs if we keep growing and that's something that we don't ever want to see happen because then kids that might really want to pursue it may not be able to be in that program," Ervin added.

Section 7. Election Services Contract; Joint Election. The District will contract with the County for election services and will conduct a joint election with other participating governmental entities in Gonzales and Caldwell counties who are holding elections on Election Day. The President of the Board of Trustees, the Superintendent, or their designees, are authorized to negotiate and enter into the Election Services Contract and one or more joint election agreements, or similar contracts or agreements with the County and any joint election participants, if desired or required to comply with applicable law.

Section 8. Notice of Election. Notice of the Election shall be given in the manner required by law.

Section 9. Conduct of Election. The Election shall be held in accordance with the Code, except as modified by the Texas Education Code, and the Federal Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended, including particularly Chapter 272 of the Code pertaining to bilingual requirements.

Section 10. Required Information.

(a) Pursuant to Section 3.009, Texas Election Code: (i) the proposition language that will appear on the ballot is set forth in Section 3 of this Election Order, (ii) the purposes for which the bonds are to be authorized are set forth in Section 2 of this Election Order, (iii) the principal amount of bonds to be authorized is set forth in Section 2 of this Election Order, (iv) if the issuance of bonds is authorized by voters, taxes sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the annual principal of and interest on the bonds and the costs of any credit agreements may be imposed, (v) bonds authorized pursuant to this Election Order may be issued to mature over not to exceed 35 years from their date of issuance, (vi) based on market conditions at the time of this Election Order, the maximum net effective interest rate on any series of the bonds authorized at the Election is estimated to be 4.50%, (vii) as of the date of this Election Order, (A) the aggregate amount of outstanding principal of the District's debt obligations is \$2,445,000, (B) the aggregate amount of outstanding interest on the District's debt obligations is \$725,850, and (C) the District's ad valorem debt service tax rate is \$0.0743 per \$100 assessed valuation of taxable property.

(b) The statements contained in this Section (i) are based on information available to the District on the date of adoption of this Election Order, including projections obtained from the District's financial advisor, (ii) necessarily consist of estimates and projections that are subject to change based on facts, circumstances and conditions at the time that bonds approved pursuant to this Election Order are issued and (iii) are not intended to limit the authority of the Board to issue bonds in accordance with other terms contained in this Election Order. Accordingly, actual tax rates, interest rates, maturity dates, aggregate outstanding indebtedness and interest on such debt will vary and will be established after the bonds are issued. To the extent of any conflict between this subsection and other terms of this Election Order, such other terms control.

The Voter Information Document shall be posted in the same manner as is required for the posting of this Election Order, pursuant to the provisions of Section 4.003(f), Texas Election Code, and may be posted as part of this Election

Section 12. Necessary Actions. The President and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees, the Superintendent, and all other appropriate officers, agents, and representatives of the District are hereby authorized and directed to take any and all actions necessary to carry out the purposes of this Election Order and to comply with the provisions of the Code and the Federal Voting Rights Act in carrying out and conducting the Election, whether or not expressly authorized herein.

Section 13. Severability. If any provision, section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Election Order, or the application of same to any person or set of circumstances is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, void, invalid, or unenforceable, neither the remaining portions of this Election Order nor their application to other persons or sets of circumstances shall be affected thereby, it being the intent of the District in adopting this Election Order that no portion hereof or provision or regulation contained herein shall become inoperative or fail by reason of any unconstitutionality, voidness, invalidity or unenforceability of any other portion hereof, and all provisions of this Election Order are declared to be severable for that purpose.

Section 14. Effective Date. This Election Order is effective immediately upon its passage and approval.



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
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## 67th Saturn Homecoming held


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
